2 THE COURTROOM DEPUTY: All of the parties are here
3 for United States versus Joaquin Serrapio.

4 THE COURT: For the record, appearing on behalf of
5 the United States.

6 MR. SCHLESSINGER: Good afternoon, Your Honor. Seth
7 Schlessinger, appearing on behalf of the United States.

8 THE COURT: Appearing on behalf of the Defendant.

9 MR. ROSS: Alan Ross, Your Honor. Good afternoon.

10 THE COURT: Mr. Ross, I called this hearing because I
11 am certain that your client does not understand what
12 supervised release means, and I was quite concerned by an
13 interview that he gave to his school newspaper, as well as in
14 conversations with his probation officer, his supervising
15 officer, that he doesn't understand that he is doing a
16 sentence, which is why I called for this status hearing today.

17 MR. ROSS: Your Honor, if I may.

18 When I received the notice of hearing, I scoured the
19 horizon for why. I called Your Honor's chambers, I called
20 Mr. Schlessinger; everywhere. I called the probation officer
21 who was supervising his GPS; of course I called my client,
22 thinking maybe there was a violation of a condition of his
23 release, and I could find none.

24 But I did learn ultimately and did see the school
25 newspaper, yes, Your Honor, and the reason --

1 THE COURT: Mr. Schlessinger, have you seen this?

2 MR. SCHLESSINGER: No. I have just been able to skim
3 it just now outside.

4 THE COURT: Ivan, would you hand this to
5 Mr. Schlessinger, please.

6 THE COURTROOM DEPUTY: Yes, Judge.

7 MR. ROSS: I very quickly -- and Mr. Schlessinger
8 arrived just before the Court started -- gave him a little
9 preview of what I thought was going to be the issue today,
10 which it is.

11 So Your Honor, I searched high and low and concluded
12 this had to be -- I'm actually just seeing the actual
13 newspaper. I downloaded this on the internet -- it's not
14 quite as bad, when you download it on the internet, as it is
15 here -- and immediately concluded that this Court
16 understandably would be very upset, given the expressions of
17 remorse that were made at his sentencing hearing, given our
18 commitment to help other young people understand the dangers;
19 and moreover, to convey his sincere remorse, and we understand
20 that.

21 When I saw this, I, too, was livid, and I would like
22 the Court to know, I have spent some trying to piece this back
23 together.

24 Your Honor, I want the Court to know, the headline,
25 It Was Pretty Funny, Mr. Serrapio has never said that to

1 anybody about threatening the president.

2 In an effort to piece this together, I asked
3 Mr. Serrapio to go through the conversations that he had, and
4 I would like to tell the Court, just quickly in a chronology,
5 how things happened.

6 He was -- after the sentencing, which I believe was
7 August 22nd, he was very shortly thereafter put on his GPS
8 monitoring, home confinement, he has been compliant.

9 It took a couple days, but as I think I said at his
10 sentencing hearing, the Court should have been advised, the
11 school was not letting him register for this current semester
12 to finish his school there.

13 He has just three classes to go, nine credits, and
14 they wouldn't let him re-register until the sentencing hearing
15 was over, but once they observed that the Court gave probation
16 in the case and gave him home confinement and was going to
17 allow him to attend school, they allowed him to enroll.

18 He promptly did and started to attend school and
19 hasn't had any issues whatsoever with GPS monitoring or going
20 anywhere or being anywhere.

21 He walks out of a classroom, and a girl by the name
22 of Karina Castrillo, who is a reporter with the Miami-Dade
23 College newspaper -- let me note, this is a college newspaper,
24 Your Honor, these aren't professional newspeople -- but she
25 confronts him outside his classroom and says to him, "Would

1 you like to write an article for the paper?"

2 His response was, "About what; about me, about what
3 happened to me?"

4 She attended the sentencing hearing, I met her here.
5 She said, "Why don't you write an article about what the judge
6 told you to write about."

7 He said, "I'll do it."

8 Your Honor, the article appears, The Biggest Mistake
9 of My Life, and I have it marked separately as an exhibit if
10 we need to do that, The Biggest Mistake of My Life. And he
11 wrote what I considered to be an article that truly hit home
12 where we wanted it to hit home; to forewarn others this was
13 the biggest mistake of his life; to forewarn others that, as
14 the Court said, what you post on Facebook is your resume for
15 the rest of your life, and I think he made those points, they
16 stay with you.

17 And so much so, Your Honor, that, in fact, he
18 received an e-mail regarding that, but let me get back to that
19 and finish the chronology quickly.

20 So Karina Castrillo asked him if he will write it; he
21 says yes, when she says that's what it is about. She
22 instructs him -- this was on a Tuesday, just before
23 September 1st. She instructs him it has to be 400 words or
24 more, instructs him that it has to be done by Saturday.

25 On that Friday, which I believe was September 1st,

1 Your Honor, he transmits the article to Karina Castrillo at
2 her AOL e-mail address, and I have a copy of the actual
3 article -- it was just slightly edited in the newspaper --
4 that he wrote. Again, I think it hits exactly what the Court
5 would have hoped is what he would be saying to others.

6 A couple of days -- then he got a text message, after
7 he sent it to her, from Karina Castrillo, advising that the
8 article was great, there were just a couple of small edits
9 they had to make grammatically, and they actually wanted to
10 know if he would be interested in writing further articles for
11 the paper, columns for the paper. He indicated he is really
12 not into writing, as much as he is into music.

13 Subsequently, Your Honor, he got a phone call from
14 Karla Barrios, who purports to be the author of the article
15 that appears on the left side of this paper. Karla Barrios
16 said to him -- and I want to give the Court an exhibit, if I
17 may, but Karla Barrios said to him -- she introduced herself,
18 asked how he was doing; said she had spoken to him after his
19 sentencing hearing on the day he was sentenced.

20 He responded that he was doing as well as he could be
21 under -- could be in his situation. She told Joaquin that she
22 had read his column and that it was good. She asked if
23 Joaquin was happy that he got house arrest, instead of going
24 to prison. Joaquin responded that he was beyond grateful that
25 he was on house arrest because it enables him to take care of

1 things, like schoolwork and music.

2 Karla Barrios said she was surprised that Joaquin was
3 able to do those things while on home confinement and asked if
4 house arrest was anything like prison. In response to that
5 question, he responded, "No, they can't imprison me in my own
6 home, I'm allowed to go to school."

7 She then asked, "How long have you been living
8 there?" He responded he had been living there since 1998.
9 She asked further if Joaquin was happy that he was allowed to
10 go to school, and he responded that he was ecstatic, as he
11 only had three courses left and he would be done.

12 She asked about his music and if Joaquin had played
13 more shows; Joaquin said he had. She asked how Joaquin felt
14 when he read all of the things that people -- and this is, I
15 think, the most important. She asked how Joaquin felt when he
16 read all of the things people were posting about him and
17 posting the articles about him after he had been arrested.
18 And Joaquin answered that he thought it was pretty funny to he
19 and his friends, reading that stuff; not referring at all to
20 the threat against the president, but referring to the posts
21 against him.

22 She inquired, "What was funny?" And Joaquin
23 explained that it was the hypocrisy of people wishing harm to
24 him for his having wished harm to someone else, so they were
25 doing exactly what he had done.

1 Karla laughed, acknowledged that's true. Karla asked
2 if Joaquin's parents had read the posts about Joaquin as well.
3 Joaquin said that they had, and that they did not think they
4 were funny.

5 Karla asked if this had affected Joaquin's music in a
6 positive or negative way. Joaquin responded that actually, it
7 had affected his music in a positive way, explaining that
8 after he was released from jail on February 27th and after the
9 articles appeared about this case and his arrest, he did a
10 show right after that, and that people that he didn't know,
11 that he had never seen in the audience before, showed up just
12 to see the kid who threatened the president, and those people
13 have continued to come back to additional shows. For that
14 reason, he said it was positive.

15 She indicated that's good, she was glad to hear that
16 it hadn't hindered him. The conversation concluded with Karla
17 saying it was nice talking to him and she wished him the best.

18 Your Honor, I have -- if the Court wishes, we have
19 typed out the document and highlighted the quotes that appear
20 because, Your Honor, I suggest to the Court that this is
21 yellow journalism. That's what it is.

22 This is taking quotes completely out of context. It
23 Was Pretty Funny is a headline, a headline that suggests that
24 he said that it was pretty funny to threaten the president.

25 Your Honor, please be assured, Joaquin Serrapio

1 doesn't think it was funny. He stupidly thought it was a
2 humorous thing to do at the time, when he did it initially,
3 but he doesn't think it is funny, and he didn't tell this
4 reporter that it was so.

5 Since this happened and since I discovered this, Your
6 Honor, I have made it my campaign to try to speak to Karla
7 Barrios and to speak to Katrina Castrillo. I have -- when I
8 called Karina Castrillo, she referred me to the faculty
9 adviser, a gentleman by the name of Manolo Barco, at
10 Miami-Dade College South Campus. He is the faculty adviser
11 for the newspaper.

12 I left at least a half dozen messages for him. I
13 then e-mailed both Karina Castrillo and Karla Barrios numerous
14 times -- I have copies, I printed those e-mails out -- telling
15 them that obviously, they have misquoted -- not misquoted,
16 because the quotes are actually accurate, they are just
17 completely taken out of context. This is not at all what he
18 was conveying.

19 I fully understand, Your Honor, looking at this
20 article, how the Court would not just justifiably, but
21 completely understandably reach the conclusion that he doesn't
22 appreciate that he is serving a sentence.

23 Your Honor, I assure you that he does. He has been
24 compliant to the absolute letter and the moment when he is
25 supposed to be home, he is home; when he is supposed to be at

1 school, he's at school. He hasn't taken advantage. The only
2 thing he asked for, other than -- actually, since he has been
3 on home confinement, he hasn't done another musical show, so
4 he hasn't asked for that.

5 He asked for school, he goes to church on Wednesday
6 afternoon and last week, I believe it was on Friday, he needed
7 to go to Secret Service to pick up some belongings that were
8 finally returned to him through the cooperation of
9 Mr. Schlessinger and the Secret Service, and he had to get
10 permission to do that, and he has done all of those things.

11 Your Honor, one of the things that's interesting is
12 in this same -- he was flabbergasted. When he saw this, Your
13 Honor, he was flabbergasted, and he sent a text message and I
14 have printed it out, and in his text -- this was to Karina,
15 the girl that asked him to write the article.

16 And he wrote to her, "Why did you head your article
17 like that?" It is really not her article, it was another
18 reporter, this girl, Karla Barrios, but he didn't even know
19 Karla Barrios.

20 This interview that Karla Barrios was making mention
21 to, Your Honor, was a phone call. He had no idea that this
22 was supposedly an interview for a news article, but even if he
23 had, these are not statements that he made. These are
24 statements he made in a completely different context.

25 And he wrote to Karina, "Why did you head your

1 article like that? Well, there is nothing anyone can do now,
2 but that wasn't good for me and the trouble that I'm in."

3 He did receive, however, interestingly enough, an
4 e-mail on September -- let's see, September 1st -- I'm sorry,
5 Your Honor. I'm looking at the wrong one.

6 He received an e-mail, Your Honor, on September 11th.
7 The article was printed -- I think it actually came out on the
8 11th, but I also saw on the internet the date of the 10th, so
9 I'm not too sure, but the 11th, I believe.

10 This is an e-mail that he received because, if you
11 recall, underneath his article, Biggest Mistake of My Life, it
12 says Joaquin Serrapio, with his e-mail address. Written to
13 that e-mail address from another student, Sarah Milla,
14 M-I-L-L-A, at mynbc.net, and it says, "Just a friendly
15 message." I would like to read that to the Court.

16 This is to Joaquin after his article appeared, even
17 with this horrible yellow journalism appearing next to it:
18 "Hey, man, I really enjoyed the article you wrote in The
19 Reporter. Not many people understand the risks they are
20 bringing themselves when posting in a social network. I just
21 wanted to let you know that your story is being read and how
22 it is also influencing me to be more careful as to what I post
23 online. I hope you succeed in any path you choose to take,
24 best of luck, Sarah Nade, N-A-D-E."

25 Your Honor, it had -- his sorry had the affect -- and

1 I postured to the Court the idea that he speak to groups as
2 part of his community service, and this was his very first
3 effort at complying with that, was to write this article. I
4 don't think the Court would disagree, I think the article that
5 he wrote is well taken and well written.

6 Your Honor, we are here -- and when I got this
7 notice, of course, I'm troubled by the fact that we are here
8 because of a newspaper, but not only do I get it, he gets it
9 and he got it before I did. He understood that Your Honor was
10 not going to be pleased to read this in the newspaper.

11 Your Honor, he did not say, as related and suggested
12 by this, that it was pretty funny referring to that.

13 All of the quotes I have highlighted were in the
14 context of -- the home confinement, for example. It wasn't
15 asking him, you know, is it punishment or anything. She was
16 juxtaposing home confinement to prison, and in that context he
17 said, "You can't confine me -- "you can't imprison me," using
18 the word imprisonment, "in my own home. I'm allowed to go to
19 school, I'm allowed to work, I'm allowed to do those things,"
20 and that's an appropriate response. It is not at all
21 flippant.

22 His honest response to the question about, "Has this
23 affected your music and the shows you are doing," and he
24 answered quite honestly. It is -- PT Barnum is the great guy
25 that quoted, "There is no such thing as bad publicity," and I

1 guess that's true. It was horrible publicity that he got in
2 this case; but nonetheless, those that knew that he was a
3 performer and would periodically appear around Miami at
4 various venues showed up to see it, and the truth of the
5 matter is that it has been positive. He has more people
6 coming to his shows because of it.

7 Your Honor, he understands completely that this is
8 punishment. He is, and will forever be, grateful to Your
9 Honor, that the Court didn't send him to jail. It was
10 certainly apparent to all of us as at the initial part of the
11 sentencing hearing that the Court was very seriously
12 considering that option.

13 I'm suggesting to the Court -- I don't want to make
14 legal arguments to the Court about -- I don't want to make
15 legal arguments at all. Just the fact of the matter is, if
16 the Court wishes, I'll pass to the Court this transcription
17 that he has put it together as best he can. If the Court
18 wants to hear from him under oath, that's fine.

19 I have tried to get these news reporters to talk to
20 me. I understand their incentive to protect themselves and
21 their press reputations, so they have a bit of a bias. I
22 don't know how quickly they are going to say, "You're right,
23 we took this out of context and yes, it is an unfair
24 representation of what he had to say," but what I do note is
25 this: I have told them I want to talk to them, I have told

1 them that I may end up having to subpoena them and
2 interestingly enough, I'm taking a guess here, these two
3 gentlemen who are seated to my left and behind me are probably
4 from Miami-Dade College, sent as alternates. Neither of them
5 is showing up today.

6 I finally did receive a call yesterday afternoon from
7 the adviser, Mr. Barco, who, when I spoke to him, said, "Yes,
8 this is Manolo Barco, I'm the faculty adviser for the
9 newspaper."

10 When I started to say to him, "I would like to
11 interview both Karla and Katrina and see what they have to say
12 about this interview," he immediately said, "I'm just being
13 polite and returning your call. I'm not having a discussion
14 with you, I have no comment." That's where we are.

15 We are sort of left here floating around. I can't
16 address what he may have said to his probation officer, but I
17 will say this to the Court -- and the Court observed this, I
18 think, at his sentencing -- his personality is just that.
19 Yes, it's what got him in trouble to begin with, was thinking
20 in this weird, sarcastic way he could do something by posting
21 these things and get people riled up, and here we are.

22 Here we are because he is the same somewhat flippant
23 sort of personality, and says things, but Your Honor, he had
24 no idea it was going to appear in the paper and I assure the
25 Court that this was taken completely out of context.

1 He did not in any way diminish the seriousness of it.
2 His exact words were that he is extremely grateful to the
3 Court for giving him the chance to go to school. That's why,
4 in answer to the question, "Are you glad that you were able to
5 go to school," he said, "I'm ecstatic. I only have three
6 courses to go, I'll be done."

7 He has already made plans that upon graduation from
8 Dade College, he is going to go to school in Tennessee, with
9 the Court's permission, hopefully, and he plans to continue
10 his education at another school.

11 So here we are, faced with a newspaper article that
12 he had no control over and had no knowledge was going to be
13 written, and I haven't even told this to the Court: When he
14 was told how great the article was by Karina, the first woman
15 that contacted him, Karina Castrillo, he was told afterwards,
16 "Your article is going to be on the front page."

17 You might want to know how they got that picture,
18 that's how they got that picture. He believed that -- this is
19 actually a picture that I have. The full picture is on the
20 printout from the internet. He is standing in the hallway of
21 the school, sort of leaning up against the hallway lockers in
22 the school, and he had this picture taken because at that
23 point in time -- this is a couple days after he submitted the
24 article, but a week before it was published -- he believes his
25 story, The Biggest Mistake of My Life, was going to be the

1 only story, and it was going to be the front page story, and
2 he submitted to have his picture taken.

3 It is a betrayal of huge magnitude that he finds this
4 next to his article. He takes second chair, he is on page 15,
5 in essence, the article starts here, but not through any fault
6 of his own.

7 Some fault, because now he has learned a lesson;
8 under no circumstance can he even talk to someone from the
9 press, whether they say it is for an interview or not, because
10 they can't be trusted.

11 This is a school newspaper, a college newspaper.
12 When you want people to read, you have to create things that
13 are controversial and interesting. She succeeded, but it is
14 yellow journalism. It is inaccurate, none of these things did
15 he say. Never did he, in any way, diminish the seriousness --

16 THE COURT: I thought you said the quotes were
17 accurate. Did I mishear you?

18 MR. ROSS: No, Your Honor heard me correctly. They
19 are accurate, but completely out of context. When you look
20 at, for example, the headline, It Was Pretty Funny, that's
21 referring to the threat against President Obama.

22 THE COURT: Let's remove the headline and talk
23 about -- I've learned that the author doesn't often write the
24 headline and the story may be completely different.

25 What about the context of the story?

1 MR. ROSS: The context --

2 THE COURT: What about the story? If I had picked up
3 that newspaper, Counsel, and I had seen the column written by
4 your client, I would say, "This is a young man who gets it.
5 He recognized that he did something that at 2:00 o'clock in
6 the morning, or whenever he did it, was funny, but now
7 realizes there are consequences."

8 That was the article that he wrote, that he was
9 prepared for, and that he knew was going to appear in the
10 newspaper, and could be used as part of his community service
11 activities.

12 But then the interview -- and I think you paint too
13 broad a brush to say yellow journalism. Then the interview,
14 where he is not prepared, where he is probably more than
15 likely speaking from the heart and obviously shooting from the
16 hip, is how he feels; that being given house arrest is not
17 like prison; you know, "I'm able to make my music and people
18 come out to see the guy who said he was going to kill the
19 president."

20 Those are things that he didn't have to say. He
21 could have given an interview that was very much like the
22 column that he wrote. But I think, once again, your client
23 likes being the snarkiest guy in the room. He likes being too
24 cute by half, and I'm not sure he gets the seriousness of what
25 is happening.

1 When he is here, yes, but I think outside of this
2 context, this is something -- something else.

3 I want to hear from the United States. And I
4 recognize, Mr. Schlessinger, that unlike the two of us, you
5 have not had as much time to digest the article.

6 I do want to say -- and one of my law clerks provided
7 me with the actual document -- I wanted to make sure I read
8 the hard copy version, so I wasn't proceeding only by what was
9 posted online and in the blocks. I actually read the hard
10 newspaper copy that I've given to you, Mr. Schlessinger, so
11 you may proceed.

12 MR. SCHLESSINGER: Thank you, Your Honor.

13 I have had a chance now to read the article, and I
14 agree, it is very troubling. It's troubling because of really
15 the flip attitude of the Defendant in this case that's evident
16 in this article.

17 You know, the disposition of this case, both the
18 resolution of the case through the plea agreement and the
19 Government's sentencing recommendation, big factors in both of
20 those decisions were what, you know, were represented to be
21 and what appeared to be sincere remorse, sincere contrition
22 and regret by the Defendant over this -- for this very serious
23 crime. And you can't help -- once you read this article, you
24 can't help but wonder whether it is sincere, reading this
25 article.

1 I understand Mr. Ross's proffered facts suggesting
2 every single statement in there is taken out of context and it
3 is all wrong and nothing in there is really as it appears.

4 I'm not saying he is wrong. We don't have -- we
5 don't have the writers of the article here to confirm or deny
6 that, but I think it is -- it is troubling.

7 And you know, with that, I would just simply defer to
8 the Court as to what type of action, if any, should be taken
9 at this time.

10 THE COURT: Counsel, does your client have anything
11 he wants to say?

12 MR. ROSS: Yes, Your Honor, but if I may just
13 complete my addressing the Court in this regard before he
14 does.

15 Your Honor, I think this is no more than putting on a
16 face. You know, Joaquin -- when this all happened, just as he
17 wrote in the article, you know, and to the Court at
18 sentencing, he looked out the window of his home, when the
19 agents and police were pulling up and he thought they were
20 there for like a neighbor.

21 He couldn't even fathom it, and so he puts on a face
22 for people that he is okay; that he is going to survive this;
23 that he is going to overcome it; that he is going to make a
24 success out of his life, despite the fact that he is a
25 convicted felon at age 21.

1 And that's all that I think is going on, Your Honor.
2 Your Honor used actually a great word to describe it, and that
3 is snarky. I hadn't thought -- I was thinking for a word that
4 might grasp it and I think that sort of does. That certainly
5 may be the case.

6 You know, for him to even process the thought about
7 the hypocrisy of people and the humor in that, a lot of people
8 wouldn't process in that way. I wouldn't think, "These people
9 are really doing what I did. I said some mean, bad things,
10 threatening things and now they are writing mean, bad things
11 and threatening me," but that's because he is a bright young
12 man, that's how he processes things.

13 Yes, I do think he could carry around a sad face; and
14 yes, I do think he could carry around, you know, and speak
15 more remorsefully and make sure that at any time, when
16 anybody, even in a social setting is talking to him -- because
17 again, he had no idea he was being interviewed for an article.
18 This was a casual call after he wrote this wonderful article.

19 It makes no sense, Your Honor, that he would write
20 such a wonderful article and at the same time, have a
21 conversation that is so diametrically opposed to most of what
22 he said in his article, and I understand that.

23 But I would like the Court to hear that I'm positive
24 that he gets it. I'm positive that he appreciates what the
25 Court has given him, which is an opportunity to complete his

1 education, not be separated from his family, not have to be
2 incarcerated with other criminals, either, you know, serving
3 sentences or serving the tail end of sentences. Those are all
4 options available to the Court that the Court did not do.

5 I'm not making legal arguments yet, Your Honor,
6 because I really am hopeful that our explanation for what
7 happened and the Defendant's words will address the concerns
8 of the Court and that we can go forward.

9 But with that said, Mr. Serrapio, would you like to
10 address the Court.

11 THE DEFENDANT: Your Honor, I just want it to be
12 understood that I don't find this funny at all. It is not
13 hard to believe that I wouldn't find this funny.

14 From the goodness of my heart and what was instructed
15 to me, I tried to do the right thing. I went on paper
16 thinking that if I was going to speak to anyone, to any type
17 of newspaper or media about my story, as I was instructed to
18 do, as I wanted to do, that my school, of all people, would be
19 the most fair to me and in a way represent me fairly and take
20 this situation in a positive light, and I was appalled when I
21 saw that.

22 I was scared and, I mean, I was disgusted. And I was
23 so happy when somebody e-mailed me, telling me my article,
24 what I wrote, helped them out, helped them influence their
25 decisions on what they post on social media, and I was happy

1 because that was what we were aiming for, in me doing this.

2 And this is not a joke to me. I just want this to be
3 over. I'm trying to get my stuff back on track, I want to get
4 my life together. I want to be able to finish school and I
5 want to be able to do everything I had planned to do and put
6 this situation behind me and make the best of it.

7 I understand what I did in the beginning was wrong
8 and I legitimately want to help people not make that mistake
9 or go through the horrendous year that I went through, because
10 this year hasn't been easy for me.

11 House arrest hasn't been easy for me. It is not
12 prison. It is a lot less scary than prison, but for me it
13 gets the job done because I'm able to go to school and I'm
14 able to go to work and I'm able to play shows, and I can
15 somewhat live my life normally.

16 And even being on house arrest has been difficult for
17 me to complete school, believe it or not, because -- I mean, I
18 have my school schedule on the dates -- the time and date that
19 I go to school every week, but, you know, there is time in
20 between where I need to use computers at school to complete
21 assignments and I'm scared to do so because I'm intimidated
22 with the fact of me talking to my probation officer that's in
23 charge of the home confinement, you know, and telling him, you
24 know, "Hey, can I have two hours here, can I have two hours
25 there." I feel bad, it is a scary feeling for me to be on

1 house arrest.

2 THE COURT: It is supposed to be, that's the point.

3 THE DEFENDANT: I understand.

4 THE COURT: It is not supposed to be easy, it is
5 supposed to hurt.

6 THE DEFENDANT: And it does, and I get this. This
7 isn't a joke for me. This isn't funny, and I never said that
8 threatening the president was funny.

9 Believe me, please, Your Honor, I understand. I'm so
10 tired of friends being worried, my family being worried. Like
11 I said, I just want to put this behind me.

12 THE COURT: I think they are the only people that are
13 worried; I don't think you are.

14 THE DEFENDANT: I am extremely worried.

15 THE COURT: I think your mom and dad are worried. I
16 think if I were to ask them, they would probably tell me they
17 would mortgage their soul for you. I'm not sure that the
18 reverse is true.

19 THE DEFENDANT: I assure you that it is.

20 THE COURT: I think you are kind of used to landing
21 softly and when the landing doesn't go the way you want it to
22 go -- I don't know.

23 THE DEFENDANT: I assure you, Your Honor, every time
24 I look at my ankle bracelet, I'm concerned about my future, I
25 really am. I live in fear of what I'm going to make of myself

1 because of all of this.

2 Every single day when I look down or I take a shower
3 and I see this, I --

4 THE COURT: Why isn't that the interview you gave to
5 the paper? When she asked you about being in prison, why
6 didn't you talk about that?

7 THE DEFENDANT: She asked me if there was a
8 difference between house arrest and prison. She asked me if
9 house arrest was anything like prison, and it wasn't like
10 prison.

11 It isn't being in a facility somewhere else, with
12 other people, and I was being honest. It is not -- it is
13 terrible, and I told her and I expressed to her that I'm
14 extremely grateful that I was able to be on house arrest
15 because I would be able to go to school and I would be able to
16 go to work and get things done.

17 Like I said before, I am worried. This isn't a joke
18 to me, this is my life.

19 THE COURT: Probation, may I see you at sidebar for a
20 moment, please.

21 (Discussion off the record.)

22 THE COURT: Mr. Schlessinger, Counsel for the
23 Defendant, would you approach sidebar for me, please.

24 (Discussion off the record.)

25 THE COURT: Mr. Schlessinger, anything else before I

1 rule?

2 MR. SCHLESSINGER: No, Your Honor, nothing from the
3 United States.

4 THE COURT: Counsel for the Defendant?

5 MR. ROSS: Thank you. Yes, Your Honor.

6 Two matters: First, Your Honor, sentence was
7 imposed, I believe on August 22nd. The Court imposed a
8 sentence of three years -- well, the Government's
9 recommendation was two years of probation; the Court sentenced
10 him to three years probation. There was a guideline of four
11 to ten months, zone B; the court sentenced him to 120 days of
12 home confinement, pursuant to the provisions of the sentencing
13 guidelines that authorized the substitution of home
14 confinement for incarceration.

15 After that, the Defendant reported to his probation
16 officer, signed the probation document. He paid his \$100
17 special assessment, he has paid for and is wearing a GPS
18 monitor. He has been serving the sentence of this Court for
19 approximately three weeks, and under those circumstances, Your
20 Honor, without a revocation, without a violation of his
21 supervision, and there is none, any change or alteration,
22 enhancement, enlargement of his sentence would, at this time,
23 be double jeopardy.

24 I looked for cases to point the Court to, and the
25 closest case I could find was a case from the DC circuit,

1 *United States v. Fogel*, F-O-G-E-L. I do have copies, if the
2 Court wishes, and *Counsel*, 829 F.2d 77, a 1987 case.

3 In that case, the Defendant was sentenced to 12
4 months of probation, but a special kind of drug offender -- it
5 was federal drug offender probation, I think it was called the
6 RID program, R-I-D. I had not heard of it before, but it was
7 probation.

8 And afterwards, the court then -- there was some
9 issues about his sentencing and then he came back for
10 resentencing, and then the court resented him to the same
11 12 months, but started the date from that date, and it went up
12 to the DC circuit.

13 The DC circuit said that double jeopardy forbids
14 that, and they cited with approval, interestingly, an 11th
15 Circuit case, *United States versus Jones*, at 722 F.2d 632.

16 *Jones* stands for the proposition, Your Honor, that
17 when a defendant is sentenced and begins serving his sentence,
18 that the Court cannot alter the sentence by enhancing it, by
19 enlarging it, by lengthening it. And Your Honor, I think that
20 any modification of the circumstances of his home confinement
21 would be an enlargement.

22 I think there is no question, Your Honor, that there
23 is a substantial difference between serving 120 days in a
24 halfway house and serving 120 days home confinement. I think
25 there is a huge difference. I think one has a substantial

1 strain on your liberty, you are not living at home, and the
2 other one does not. And I think, Your Honor, as a legal
3 matter, double jeopardy forbids, without a violation, an
4 actual violation -- and I understand completely the Court's
5 disappointment in reading the article, but I do think legally,
6 it is problematic.

7 Secondly, Your Honor, whether this article was
8 accurately written or not, whether the quotes were in
9 context -- and we suggest they are not even close, but even if
10 they were, at the end of the day, Your Honor is penalizing the
11 Defendant for free speech.

12 I know Your Honor is -- at his sentencing, Your Honor
13 pointed out that -- I think your quote was, "No one is more
14 pro free speech than I," and Your Honor, I checked that out
15 because I haven't appeared that much before the Court, and I
16 found out that is absolutely true.

17 I saw case after case where the Court has -- I saw
18 the Court struck down a Florida statutes some years ago that
19 ran amuck of the First Amendment with some physicians. As a
20 matter of fact, interestingly, the Court -- there was
21 interesting press about that, proving, again, that the
22 headlines are not within the control of you or not in control
23 of the Defendant.

24 But at the end of the day, at the end of the day, the
25 Court would be imposing a sanction for free speech, speech

1 that the Court may disagree with, free speech that the Court
2 may conclude doesn't evidence the kind of fully accepting
3 remorse that the Court would like to see, but Your Honor, at
4 the end of the day, it's punishing free speech.

5 I would ask the Court that considering the legal
6 impediments to modification, there has been no violation
7 whatsoever, he has fulfilled all of the conditions of his
8 supervision, and Your Honor, he has heard clearly today what
9 the Court has to say, he is fully accepting of responsibility.
10 He is -- he truly does get it, Your Honor.

11 He truly understands that the Court has given him a
12 second chance by allowing him to serve his 120 days in his
13 home, with his family, allowing him to go to school, allowing
14 him to go to work, and I would ask the Court; therefore, to
15 not modify any of the conditions, both for the factual reason
16 that he does, in fact, get it, hasn't done anything or said
17 anything to deserve otherwise and because to do so would be
18 both to violate the double jeopardy prohibition and the First
19 Amendment, Your Honor.

20 THE COURT: Everybody have a seat for a moment for
21 me, please.

22 (Pause in proceedings.)

23 THE COURT: First of all, I want to go back to the
24 legal argument, whether or not this Court has the authority to
25 modify the terms and conditions of a sentence of probation.

1 And I am looking at 18 USC 3563, which discusses the
2 conditions of probation and it says, in paragraph C, "The
3 Court may modify, reduce or enlarge the conditions of a
4 sentence of probation at any time prior to the expiration or
5 termination of the term of probation pursuant to the provision
6 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure relating to the
7 modification of probation and the provisions applicable to the
8 initial setting of the conditions."

9 So I think that any modification of the terms of
10 probation is permitted legally under the statute and
11 envisioned in reviewing Chapter Seven of violations of
12 probation and supervised release.

13 So first of all, Counsel, I think you are correct. I
14 don't think that the -- this is or could be considered a
15 violation of probation hearing, and the record should reflect
16 that. But I am capable of modifying the conditions of
17 probation, which I plan to do now, and I'm going to ask the
18 Defendant to stand.

19 Sir, you are an adult. It is time that you
20 understand that there are consequences for your actions, and
21 this is serious, so I am going to modify the terms and
22 conditions of your probation and I'm going to sentence you,
23 for the next 45 days, to a halfway house to be determined by
24 the Department of Probation, and you are to be supervised from
25 there.

1 You are to continue to attend school. I am placing
2 you on a curfew, conditioned on your school, from 6:00 a.m. to
3 10:00 p.m. every day. The only way that you cannot stand by
4 those conditions is with the prior approval of your probation
5 officer.

6 I also am going to order that your home confinement
7 continue for a period of one year after you're released from
8 the halfway house, with the electronic monitoring, and if the
9 probation officer finds that it's necessary, for you to submit
10 to mental health treatment.

11 I understand that since you are not in custody, the
12 provisions have to be made for a halfway house, so you will --
13 you will still maintain the terms and conditions of your
14 release that you have until the probation officer is able to
15 establish a facility for you.

16 That will probably take the next three to four days,
17 Counsel, but you should make sure that during that period of
18 time, he maintains the terms and conditions of his release.

19 Anything further on behalf of the United States?

20 MR. SCHLESSINGER: Nothing from the Government, Your
21 Honor.

22 THE COURT: Anything on behalf of the Defendant?

23 MR. ROSS: May the objections that were made be
24 noted?

25 THE COURT: Your objections are noted for the record.
