VIRUS Jocabulary

Coronavirus A family of viruses named for the spikes on its surface that look like crowns. Corona is Spanish for "crown." They can cause colds and respiratory illnesses. A new strain is called a novel virus.

COVID-19 The disease caused by the virus, it is short for coronavirus disease 2019. The virus is named SARS-CoV-2

Flatten the Curve To spread out the number of cases over a longer period of time because too many cases at once can overwhelm the health care system and lead to shortages of hospital space, medical equipment, and doctors and nurses.

Novel Virus Pandemic - A sudden rise in the number of cases of a disease that takes place all over the world.

PPE - Personal protective equipment worn by health care workers to lower their risk of infection.

Quarantine - To separate people who may be infected, but don't show symptoms of sickness. When healthy people separate themselves, it is called a self-quarantine.

Social Distancing - To avoid large gatherings and, when being around others is necessary, stay at least six feet away from other people.
